EU member state since 1995






Why Sweden?

Limit your CV to max two A4 pages
Cover letter preferably one page
Do not send certificates or references, can be sent later if requested
Turn directly to the employer you wish to work for. Open applications are
common and appreciated by employers

Working conditions in Sweden

- Collective agreements between trade unions and employer organisations
- Full time, 40 hours per week
- Type of contracts: temporary or permanent
- Vacation: 25 days per year
- Salary: no national minimum salary
- Municipal tax between 29-35 %
- Average wage 2024 38300 SEK/month gross

Unemployment insurance

- Everyone who works in Sweden has a right to become a member of an unemployment insurance fund to get financially covered in case of unemployment.
- Not part of the social security scheme, but a voluntary insurance linked to membership in an unemployment fund
- Handled, and paid out by the unemployment funds
- If you are not a member of an unemployment benefit fund, you can apply for membership and basic compensation in case you become unemployed.
- If you do not want to become a member of an unemployment benefit fund, you can apply for basic compensation from the "Alfa-kassan" fund.

Targeted Mobility Scheme (TMS) Sweden aims to match candidates across EU with employers with hard to fill vacancies, including EURES mobility services and various financial supports.

Target groups are jobseekers aged 18 or older and employers from an **EU country**, **Norway**, **or Iceland**.

Unemployment & benefits for the EEA area Your Europe

Form PDU2, also called U2

You can carry on receiving your unemployment benefit for at least **3 months** from the EU country where you were last working - and **up to a maximum of 6 months**, depending on the institution paying your benefit.

U2 (formerly E 303) Authorisation to continue receiving unemployment benefit while looking for a job in another country.

Issued by the <u>public employment</u> <u>service or the competent social</u> <u>security institution</u> in the country where you became unemployed. Submit it to the <u>national</u> <u>employment service</u> in the country where you are looking for a job.



Unemployment & benefits for the EEA area Your Europe

If you need to certify any previous periods of employment and social security cover abroad, you may need to apply for a <u>U1 form</u> (formerly E 301 form) in the country where you worked before.

U1 (formerly E 301)

Statement of insurance periods to be taken into account when calculating an unemployment benefit.

Issued by the <u>public</u>
employment service or the
competent social security
institution in the last
country(ies) where you worked.
Submit it to the <u>national</u>
employment service in the
country where you wish to
receive unemployment benefit.
